Course Overview

The 11238NAT Diploma of Christian Ministry and Theology is a nationally recognised vocational qualification for Korean-speaking students seeking broader preparation for Christian ministry, teaching and leadership. It develops integrated biblical, theological and practical knowledge that may be applied in churches, ministry and parachurch organisations, Christian education, community, health, aged care, charitable and not-for-profit contexts.

Students develop knowledge and skills to analyse biblical texts, interpret and communicate Christian beliefs and practices, teach or transmit ministry and theological knowledge, and plan, coordinate and evaluate ministry activities. The course supports students to exercise autonomy, initiative and judgement in organising their own work and, where relevant, coordinating and evaluating the work of others within broad but generally well-defined organisational and ethical parameters.

The course also provides opportunities for personal ethical formation and reflective development relevant to responsible ministry practice. Training and assessment are conducted in Korean.

Ministry and Vocational Relevance

This course may be relevant to people who are serving, or preparing to serve, in church, ministry, mission, Christian education, community-oriented or not-for-profit settings. Depending on organisational requirements and the student's prior experience, the course may support preparation for roles or service contexts such as:

- pastor, deacon, catechist or lay preaching roles, subject to church or denominational requirements
- youth ministry, evangelism or lay ministry work
- ministry leadership, team coordination or management responsibilities
- teaching or Christian formation activities within churches or Christian organisations
- religious education teaching, where the person also meets any teaching qualification, registration and employer requirements applying to the role
- service in Christian education, community, health, aged care, mission, charitable or not-for-profit organisations.

Some ministry, education, care, management and church-related roles require commissioning, ordination, appointment, registration, additional qualifications, relevant experience or approval by a religious institution, employer, professional body or other organisation. Completion of this qualification does not guarantee employment, commissioning, ordination, appointment or registration.

Course Structure

The course is delivered over four terms of 10 weeks. Students complete 10 units of competency: 2 core units and 8 elective units. The unit sequence below is indicative of the planned delivery structure:

The table shows the term in which each unit is expected to commence. Some units may continue across more than one term to provide sufficient time for instruction, practice, feedback and assessment.

Delivery and Weekly Study Requirements

The course is delivered through:

- 8 hours of face-to-face classroom training per scheduled study week
- 6 hours of compulsory supervised fieldwork per scheduled study week and
- 6 hours of structured online learning per scheduled study week.

Students are required to attend scheduled classroom training and fieldwork, participate in learning activities and complete required online learning and assessment activities by the specified dates. Attendance and completion of required activities are recorded and monitored.

Structured online learning activities are prescribed by ICC and completed across the study week. The activities support and extend learning undertaken through classroom training and fieldwork.

Students should also expect to undertake additional private study, research, reflection and assessment preparation outside the required course activities.

Compulsory Supervised Fieldwork

The course includes six hours per week of supervised fieldwork, normally undertaken in a church setting approved by ICC. Fieldwork provides opportunities for students to apply course learning in practice and, where applicable, demonstrate evidence relevant to unit requirements.

Students must complete fieldwork in accordance with ICC's Fieldwork Guidelines, approved supervision arrangements and applicable church and organisational requirements.

Assessment Methods

Assessment is competency-based and uses a range of methods over time. Students must provide sufficient evidence that they can meet the requirements of each unit of competency.

Training and assessment are conducted in Korean. Assessment methods may include:

- written or oral questions and short written responses
- assignments, reports, projects and biblical or theological interpretation tasks
- case studies, scenarios, simulations or role plays
- presentations, ministry-related practical activities and trainer observation
- portfolios of evidence and, where appropriate, third-party evidence or supervisor reports.

Recognition of Prior Learning and Credit Transfer

ICC offers applicants and students opportunities to apply for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) and Credit Transfer.

RPL may be granted where sufficient evidence demonstrates relevant prior skills, knowledge and experience. Credit Transfer may be granted for equivalent units supported by valid AQF certification documentation or an authenticated VET transcript. Applicants should indicate their interest before or at the time of enrolment.

Further Study and Pathways

This course is a standalone nationally recognised qualification and forms the Diploma-level qualification within ICC's Christian Ministry and Theology course suite.

Students who have completed relevant units within the 11237NAT Certificate IV in Christian Ministry and Theology may be eligible for Credit Transfer where those units are equivalent and are included in ICC's 11238NAT course structure.

Students seeking further vocational development in Christian ministry and theology may apply for the 11239NAT Advanced Diploma of Christian Ministry and Theology. Credit Transfer may be available where completed units are equivalent and are included in the receiving course structure. Admission and credit are subject to the requirements applying at the time of application.

Student Support

ICC provides support to assist students to participate in training and complete assessment requirements. Students may contact their trainer, assessor, Academic Manager or Student Support Officer for assistance.

- academic, study and assessment support
- learning, literacy, numeracy and digital learning support or referral
- reasonable adjustments for students with disability, where appropriate and practicable
- wellbeing support or referral to external support services where required
- support through email, phone, Zoom or individual learning/assessment support sessions.

Learning Resources and Technology

Students have access to ICC learning resources and to Camden Theological Library under ICC's institutional arrangement. Relevant theological and Korean-language resources are available in print and/or electronic formats. Further information about the Library and its services is available at library.nswact.uca.org.au.

Students must have access to a reliable laptop or tablet, reliable internet, email, web browsers, word-processing software such as Microsoft Office 365 or an equivalent suite, and the ability to access online learning platforms and submit assessments electronically.

Entry and Suitability Requirements

National course entry requirements

The course itself does not prescribe mandatory entry requirements. ICC nevertheless applies its own admission and suitability requirements to ensure that applicants are prepared for Korean-language study and assessment at Diploma level.

ICC admission requirements

Applicants must:

- be at least 18 years of age
- have completed an equivalent secondary schooling level such as a High School Certificate, or be able to demonstrate suitable work, life or ministry experience
- have sufficient Korean language skills to participate in training, complete assessment tasks and engage with learning resources
- have learning, literacy, numeracy and digital skills suitable for the course level and modes of delivery
- participate in ICC's pre-enrolment suitability assessment, which may include an interview with the Academic Manager or delegate.

ICC assesses each applicant's suitability for its Korean-language delivery and assessment context before enrolment.

Course Fees and Payment Arrangements

The following tuition fee applies to domestic students for this course.

Other fees and charges that may apply are listed in ICC's Schedule of Fees and Charges, available on the ICC website.

Domestic tuition fees are invoiced progressively by instalments during each term. ICC structures these instalments so that it does not receive more than \$1,500 in prepaid fees from or on behalf of a student for services yet to be delivered in relation to the same course.

ICC generally issues the first invoice after the initial two weeks of the term and a further invoice around the middle of the term. The amount and due date of each instalment are stated in the student's Letter of Offer and invoice. Students should pay only amounts formally invoiced by ICC.

Tuition payments are therefore made progressively as training and assessment services are delivered.

Refund eligibility and processes are set out in ICC's Fees Management & Refund Policy and Procedure. This does not limit any rights a student may have under the Australian Consumer Law.

Application Process

To apply, domestic applicants should complete the Domestic Student Enrolment Form available from the ICC website and submit it to info@iona.edu.au with the required supporting documents.

1. Submit application: Complete the Domestic Student Enrolment Form and provide required supporting documents, including evidence of identity, prior study or experience, and any documents requested by ICC to assess course suitability.
2. Application review: ICC reviews the application for completeness and assesses whether the applicant meets course entry and suitability requirements.
3. Pre-enrolment interview: Applicants may be interviewed by the Academic Manager or delegate to assess suitability and capacity to undertake the course.
4. Offer and enrolment documents: If the application is accepted, ICC issues a Letter of Offer, invoice and relevant enrolment documents for review and acceptance.
5. Acceptance and payment: The applicant accepts the offer and pays required fees in accordance with ICC's invoice and payment arrangements.
6. Commencement: ICC confirms timetable, start date and study arrangements before the course commences.

Qualification Issuance

On successful completion of all required training and assessment, ICC will issue the 11238NAT Diploma of Christian Ministry and Theology and a record of results listing the units of competency completed. Where a student withdraws after successfully completing one or more units, ICC will issue a Statement of Attainment for those units.

ICC will issue the relevant AQF certification documentation within 30 calendar days after completion of the final assessment, provided all agreed fees associated with the course have been paid. Because this course is delivered and assessed in Korean, ICC certification documentation will state that the relevant units have been delivered and assessed in Korean, in accordance with national VET requirements.
